#### PLANT AND GARDEN CARE

S cout the yard for evergreen cuttings, holly berries, dried pods and any other natural materials you can use for decorating.

Dig a hole ahead of time and store soil in warm spot if you plan to use a live evergreen as a Christmas tree. Cover the hole with a board so no one falls in.



If you didn't already do it, make windbreaks for borderline-hardy broad-leaf evergreens, erect barriers over plants that have been flattened in the past by snow and ice sliding off nearby roofs, and wrap hardware cloth or similar protection around the base of young trees and shrubs

to protect from rodents gnawing.

Prevent frost cracks on thin-barked trees such as maples and fruit trees by wrapping trunks with tree wrap or by painting them with latex paint.

Poinsettias should be unsleeved in the store, but they should be sleeved for on the way home to protect from cold wind. Make sure water can drain out of poinsettia pots so the roots don't rot (use a tray underneath).



## PLANNING

Collect new seed catalogs and put them aside for consultation after the hectic holidays are over. There will be lots of enticing new varieties of many of the vegetables and herbs you are already growing. Check your seed supply to make a list of what you'll need to order/buy new for the coming season.

Check out the garden centers for many other colorful live-plant options besides poinsettias, such as



ornamental peppers, kalanchoe, cyclamen, bromeliads, 'Diamond Frost' euphorbia, even blooming mini-cactus.

Last chance to get those last few spring-flowering bulbs in the ground.

Last chance to get the hoses, pots, ornaments and statuary inside before winter damage threatens.

Pot up more amaryllis, paper-whites or pre-chilled hyacinths for winter blooms inside.

Clean and store lawn mower and garden tools for the winter if you didn't do it last month.

Assess how gardens fared this past new year and make plans for improvements next season.

After Christmas, cut branches off your tree and interlock them around the base of roses or other tender plants for winter insulation. Chip/shred the branches as mulch in spring. Cut and dry the trunks for future firewood.

Make your Christmas list of gardening goodies.

#### GROOMING

Cut back the dead stems of plants in the garden for a final cleanup. To keep the area neat, pick up twigs and branches that drop from trees onto beds.

#### **PROBLEM SOLVING**

Snow is not a problem. The cover it provides insulates the soil and provides bulbs, seeds, and microbial life

beneath the soil surface. It helps hold in moisture and provides more moisture when it melts.





# BIRTH MONTH FLOWERS AND THEIR MEANINGS

# **DECEMBER: THE NARCISSUS**

The narcissus is the birth flower for anyone who celebrates their special day in December and stands for faithfulness, good wishes and respect. Most flowers of the narcissus genus bloom in the early spring but



species like the paperwhite narcissus can be found in all their glory in cold winter months like December as well.

The December birth flower has a rich history and is very popular across the globe. Originating in the Mediterranean, the Narcissus was brought to Asia where it became widely spread across China. From there, the narcissus made its way into Europe via European colonists and eventually made its way into North America. Today, the Narcissus is mainly grown in Great Britain, Holland, and The Channel Isles.

The Narcissus birth flower commonly represents modesty,

respect, and faithfulness within art and literature. However, as the flower traveled, what it symbolized evolved. For example, in China, the Narcissus flower represents wealth and prosperity while Victorians consider it to be a flower that represented egoistic personalities. In those situations, the Narcissus flower represents a chance for change and future success.

Now that you know what the December flower is as well as what it symbolizes we can explore how its meaning differs by color. Narcissus are generally white or yellow, but can also be orange or pink in garden varieties.

These are the perfect flowers to include in a birthday flower bouquet so your friend or family member knows how much you appreciate them. The extra thought you put into sending them flowers for their special day won't go unnoticed and it'll be a great conversation starter at their birthday party!

# Two 2023 THS Scholarships Awarded

The Scholarship Committee consisted of Aurea Almazan, Phyllis Ashcraft and James Kates.

Four excellent candidates applied. All appeared to be excellent students with GPA's of 3.13 to 3.98. They all worked while in high school and in college to help pay for their education. They also participated in extra-curricular activities while in college related to their field of study.

Two \$1,000 scholarships were awarded. One was from a generous gift from the Sykes family to honor the 100th birthday of Betty Sykes. Betty was a past President of THS and is still a cherished member. The second one was from the proceeds of THS's Gift Baskets from our August Flower Show.

The Betty Sykes Scholarship was awarded to Charley Maria Silfee. Charley grew up on a Pennsylvania farm and starting earning money at an early age by raising hens to sell the eggs, as well as growing plants in a small greenhouse to sell. She has worked as a landscaper and an in-grounds maintenance at a Lavender Farm. Charley is a Freshman at Delaware Valley University Majoring in Horticulture with a GPA of 3.98. At Delaware Valley she is Secretary of the Plant Breeding Club, a member of the Floral Society, in the college honors program and a member of the Alpha Lamba Delta Honors Society. Charley's ambition is to become a Greenhouse Manager or get into large scale vegetable production, eventually running her own business.

Sadie Marie Duffy is an undergraduate student at Oregon State University with a double major of Botany and Horticulture. She has a 3.76 GPA. She has worked since high school to earn money for tuition. At Oregon State she is a student worker in the dining halls and at the universities' herbarium. In the herbarium, she works with the Oregon Floral database, physical specimens, specimen repair & photography. Sadie also volunteers with the USDA Germplasm Repository in Corvallis, Oregon. A Plant Geneticist from that facility wrote a letter of recommendation for Sadie stating that the staff rank her in the top 1% of volunteers. Sadie stated that positions that appeal to her now are plant breeder, greenhouse curator or a plant geneticist.
